BLESSED SACRAMENT ORGAN PROJECT

We have enjoyed a long history of excellence and engagement in spreading the joy of the Gospel in our region. Led and inspired by our Dominican identity and its love for the liturgy, we have presented concerts, choral Masses, and regular weekend liturgies to the glory of God and for the education and uplifting of the faithful for many years. Emerging from the pandemic, we are presented with the opportunity to restore, reinvent, and reinvigorate our music program to meet the current needs of the Parish and region with renewed focus on music in the celebration of the Mass. Over the next year we plan to restore the volunteer choir to 20-30 members, begin a regular children's music ministry, engage in regular choral Masses, and increase the level and quality of congregational singing. It is our ongoing, long-term goal to create and sustain a music program that is consistently growing and adjusting, that plans for permanence and stability, and that completes the vision of our church's founding fathers to see a place of right worship of our Creator.

Three important goals need to be met to build a foundation for restoring our music program:

- 1. **Hire a permanent Director of Sacred Music** with the appropriate credentials to train volunteers and lead a professional, adaptable, and sustainable music program, as well as the ability to lead our organ project.
- 2. Build interest and participation in the music program by increasing volunteer membership to 20-30 singers, start a children's music ministry, increase congregational singing, and engage in regular choral Masses.
- 3. Install a quality pipe organ, one that fits the space and can accommodate a diversity of musical efforts over the coming decades / century.

Thanks be to God, we've achieved the first goal by hiring a great new Director of Sacred Music in Michael Plagerman. With his help, we're now on our way to achieving the second goal, already having added new volunteers and professionals to strengthen our pool of available singers, as well as launching a summer music camp for children.

The third goal (adding a proper pipe organ) is naturally the most challenging, but also the one that we are blessed to have made significant progress recently. It's appropriate at this point to explain why a good pipe organ is so important to our church, and why the ones we have now are not sufficient.

The 2016 Organ Project

Several years ago, Blessed Sacrament had the opportunity to purchase a 1946 Aeolian Skinner organ and finally address the lack of a proper organ. Some funds were raised, and the instrument was purchased and placed in storage while plans were drawn up for its installation. However, with completing of the window restoration project and the corresponding challenge of the pandemic, those plans were forced to be put on hold indefinitely.

This past Fall, as a renewed vision was being cast for music at Blessed Sacrament, the parish staff and friars, with help from parish volunteers and consultants, began to review the Aeolian Skinner plans with the goal of bringing the project to completion. However, as we explored it further, we realized that the organ, expenses, and timeline were simply no longer feasible, and that a better option needed to be sought.

Why do the plans no longer work for the Aeolian-Skinner organ? While a beautiful instrument, its installation in the loft (while technically possible) would leave almost no room for a choir. For it to fit properly in the chambers, significant work was envisioned. Unfortunately, the planned renovations have increased substantially in cost in the wake of the pandemic. Revisiting the plans with builders and organ installers now meant that costs were too high, and the timeline would stretch five years – both things our parish and music program could not afford.

With the realization that a new approach was needed, the staff, friars, consultant, and organ committee volunteers developed a two-phased plan for adding two main organs and a small portable organ. The price and pace of this effort is one the parish could sustain, while ensuring program goals could be met and built upon. Each of these organs would serve a unique purpose with no redundancy, compromises, or needs for future alteration or adjustment.

Where Are We Now?

We have identified a beautifully sounding organ of impeccable construction – an opinion with which our consultant agrees – that will both meet and exceed our needs. And so, the first and immediate phase is to install a mechanical action organ of neo-classical design in the loft. Its footprint will allow for nearly 30 singers in the loft with a small instrumental ensemble, and its sonic resources will accompany the breadth of the repertoire for both adult and children's choirs. Further, its resources will greatly enhance our congregational singing. Its architectural design will enhance our space, and it will be the first permanent, fully-equipped organ in our historic church. Thankfully, we are blessed to have existing funds sufficient to cover the purchase price of this organ. Upon the recommendation of the organ committee, consultant, music director, and pastor, and with provincial approval, we made an offer to purchase this organ, which was approved. This brief summary captures the work of the past year. In the coming weeks, the parish will share more details on the work to come and future phases of the work.

Timeline

Completed Work

- Completed evaluation of space and program needs
- Completed structural studies
- Found, did an in-personal evaluation of, and are closing a deal on a suitable organ
- Consulted with our architect and engineer regarding installation and layout

Upcoming Plans

- Monday, January 30: Removal of the Erben Organ (South Transept Organ)
- Early February: Finish and prepare area in South transept
- Middle of February: Vermeulen Organ (Loft Organ) is moved downstairs
- February 16: Acoustical consultant comes to optimize space for new organ
- May-June: Loft is prepared for new organ, including acoustical improvements
- Mid-to-late May: The newly purchased organ is disassembled and moved to Blessed Sacrament
- July: New organ is installed



PASTOR'S CORNER

When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain, and after he had sat down, his disciples came to him. He began to teach them.

So begins the Sermon on the Mount – the most complete expression in the scriptures of the New Law of Grace spanning the next three chapters of the Gospel of Matthew.

Notably, Jesus is styled here the new Moses, the new lawgiver teaching from a mountain as Moses taught from Mount Sinai. But our Lord is not reporting to the people what God has told him: he is God telling them, speaking to them directly. It had been God's expressed desire on Mount Sinai, as he came down in the cloud and the fire, that the people might be a kingdom of priests, all of whom would speak with God. But the people refused in fear and told Moses to be their representative and mediator. But here in his incarnation the people gather around the Lord and are now taught directly by their God – not with a law destined for stone tablets, but a law to be written on their hearts.

And he begins with the Beatitudes. Like the ten commandments of the old law, the seven beatitudes, with the eighth pointing to our persecution, are the foundation of the new law. They structure the rest of the sermon and tell us a great deal of how the new law is different.

This new law is something fundamentally positive: not a string of thou shalt nots. It is something interior: an ethos, if you will, rather than a principally external ethic focused on our true happiness – our blessedness – rather than simply duty. It is something we are to grow into: the beatitudes have always been read as a spiritual journey we are called to undertake – beginning with that poverty of spirit and the recognition of our need for God and growing in them step by step. It is something prophetic: it is not something we do on our own but that the Lord works within us by the power of the Holy Spirit.

We will spend all the Sundays leading up to Lent reading the Sermon on the Mount. It is a time to go through and reacquaint ourselves with the most important text on morality for the Christian life – what Augustine called the perfect model of Christian living. May we find his law written on our hearts and form ourselves according to the blessed life to which we have been called that we may *Rejoice and be glad, in the reward which will be great in heaven*.
