

LSTC Alums Jen Nagel and Meghan Johnston Aelabouni Elected Bishops





STC is pleased to announce that the Rocky Mountain Synod has elected the Rev. Meghan Johnston Aelabouni as its new bishop for a six-year term. The election took place during the synod assembly at the Embassy Suites in Loveland, Colorado, from April 25-27, 2024.

The Rev. Jen Nagel of Minneapolis, Minnesota, was selected to serve a sixyear term as bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America's Minneapolis Area Synod. The selection occurred during the synod assembly from May 2-4 at Lord of Life Lutheran Church in Ramsey, Minnesota.

Bishop Johnston Aelabouni, who had been serving as pastor of the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer in Jerusalem and as theologian in residence with the ELCA Middle East and North Africa Desk, was elected on the fifth ballot with 232 votes. Bishop Johnston Aelabouni brings a wealth of experience to her new role, having served in various pastoral and leadership positions throughout her career.

Bishop Nagel, an LSTC alum, has been leading the University Lutheran Church of Hope in Minneapolis since 2015 and previously pastored Salem English Lutheran Church in the same city from 2003 to 2015. She also worked as a teaching staff coordinator at Holden Village in Chelan, Washington, in 2011.

Bishop Johnston Aelabouni officially took office on August 1, 2024, and was installed on October 5 at Augustana Lutheran Church in Denver. She succeeds the Rev. James W. Gonia, who has served as bishop since 2012 and retired on July 31.

Bishop Nagel was formally installed on September 21 at Central Lutheran Church in Minneapolis. She succeeds the Rev. Ann M. Svennungsen is embarking on a new chapter in retirement after serving as bishop since 2012, her last day was July 31, 2024.

A New Chapter for Worship at LSTC: Changes in the Chapel Program for Fall

his fall brings exciting changes to the worship life at LSTC, offering a rich and dynamic spiritual experience for students, faculty, and the wider community. At the heart of these changes is a shift in leadership, as Christian Scharen steps into the role of Director of the Chapel, succeeding the Rev. Erik Christensen, who has thoughtfully led the chapel program for the past seven years.

Worship on campus will maintain familiar rhythms while embracing new opportunities for engagement and reflection. Regular Monday and Wednesday services will continue to serve as the backbone of LSTC's spiritual life. Monday services, modeled on ancient patterns of daily prayer, will feature student preaching from the Intro to Preaching course in the fall and Intro to Liturgy course in the spring, creating a space for emerging voices to share the Word. These services will include scripture, song, silence, prayer, and a brief homily, all within a 30-minute timeframe.

Wednesday services, centered



around Holy Communion, will provide a space for senior students, faculty, and guest preachers to preside and share in leading worship. These services will last about an hour and offer an opportunity for deeper reflection, fellowship, and engagement with the sacred.

For those looking for a more intimate and interactive experience, every other Wednesday evening will feature Dinner Church. Held in the Life Together Center in the student housing, this service provides a



unique opportunity to gather around the table for worship and a shared meal, fostering community through conversation, prayer, and music.

As always, the aim is to foster a deep sense of connection, community, and spiritual growth. This fall's worship offerings promise to be an enriching experience, grounded in tradition yet open to innovation and collaboration. All are welcome at LSTC's chapel—where the community gathers to worship, reflect, and grow together.
